Scope of Problem

- Illegal profits:
 - (1) Timber \$51-152B PY
 - (2) Wildlife \$7-23B PY
 - (3) Mining \$11-24B PY
 - (4) Fisheries \$11-24B PY
 - = \$91-\$258B PY

Scope of Problem Cont'd

- 30% global timber trade, 22% global fisheries trade = corrupt
- Forestry Sector = \$29 billion annually corruption related profits
- INTERPOL survey = avg 250 corruption cases, per country, per year

Harm

- Destroys critical habitats
- Impacts economic development, stability, and security
- Impairs resource governance
- Loss of revenue/Suppressed market prices/Unfair playing field
- Erode respect for Rule of Law
- Endangers human health
- Climate Change
- Facilitates other crimes (drugs, guns etc)

Case examples

- U.S. vs KROMAH et al. (SDNY)
 - 190 kg rhino horns, 10 tons elephant ivory (= 35 rhinos, 100 elephants)
 - \$7,400,000
 - Poachers in Uganda
 - Sold to and laundered payments in U.S.
 - Also sold cocaine and heroin
