
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Water is one of the most valuable natural resources of the Republic of Serbia.

Planned water management and its careful preservation is one of the most important tasks.

The Water Sector Framework in the Republic of Serbia

- Current institutional set-up of the Water Sector
- Competencies distributed among state, provincial and local authorities and three state-owned water management companies.
- Key stakeholders responsible for national and international water-management
- Legislative framework
 - Effective national laws and a high number of by-laws

Institutional framework and water responsibilities

- According to the Law on Ministries, competencies are divided among following Ministries and Institutions:
- Ministry of Agriculture and Environmental Protection, with the Republic Water Directorate and Agency for Environmental Protection
- Ministry of Health
- Ministry of Construction, Transport and Infrastructure
- Ministry of Mining and Energy
- Other institutions: Republic Hydro- meteorological Service, Public Water Companies

Competencies on Regional and National level

- Regional Autonomic Province, Capital City
- responsibilities water enactment and inspection
- Local municipalities
 - Regional and local water supply (public utility water companies)
 - Wastewater collection and treatment (public utility water companies)

Legislative Framework

- Law on Waters
- Law on Environmental Protection,
- Law on the Environmental Impact Assessment,
- Law on the Integrated Prevention and Control of Environmental Pollution,
- Law on Mining and Geological Exploration,
- Law on Communal Utility Activities,
- Law on Sanitary Inspection,
- Law on Public-Private Partnerships and Concessions,
- Law on Local Self-Government,
- Law on State Administration,
- Law on Ministries, Law on Public Revenues and Expenditures, Law on Public Enterprises, Law on Planning and Construction, etc.

Harmonisation with EU water related legislation

- The 2010 Water Law largely aligned the Serbian water sector with EU legislation, primarily the Water Framework Directive but also other directives.
- Serbian Government supports the implementation of reforms, according the EU
- By-laws are synchronized with EU regulations, but not completely harmonized
- Recent EU accession talks addressing water issues held in October/November 2014, gave us an overview of necessary activities and tasks for the following years
- We are expecting EU recommendations

Campaign aimed at promoting newly adopted regulations on water quality in Serbia





2013:

- √ 10 public discussions in 10 cities across Serbia;
- over 300 representatives of local authorities, iindustry operators, public utility companies and civil society organisations

2014:

- √ 10 public discussions in 9 cities across Serbia;
- over 350 representatives of local authorities, institutes for public health, public utility companies, operators and civil society

Promotion of the Protocol on Water and Health on local level

- After ratifying the Protocol on Water and Health in April 2013. Serbia followed a two-year process leading to accession, which engaged stakeholders, and included workshops and media outreach to increase participation of local communities in activities that will be taken under the Protocol.
- Important role in this process belongs to the OSCE Mission in Serbia which supported the promotional campaign on local level, in Arhus centers and Municipalities
- Promotions on local level, brought to the table: community leaders, public health officials, businesses sector, water utilities, schools, NGO's and the civil society members, to help steer the campaign to success. Each entity provided its unique contribution.
- The community was an important resource in providing input to the campaign.

Promotion of the Protocol on Water and Health at local level




Future steps: Tasks and challenges

- Enhance cooperation among responsible authorities
- Considerable financial requirements
