By the delegation of the Russian Federation:

“In joining the consensus on the Permanent Council decision on the extension of the mandate of the OSCE Project Co-ordinator in Ukraine, we take the position that it should correspond to the new political and legal situation in the region stemming from the admission of Crimea and the city of Sevastopol to the Russian Federation. Consequently, the Co-ordinator’s activities, including project activities, do not cover these constituent entities of the Russian Federation.

I request that this statement be appended to the Permanent Council decision adopted, and included in the journal of the day.”

By the delegation of Ukraine:

“In connection with today’s PC decision on the extension of the mandate of the OSCE Project Co-ordinator in Ukraine, and the statement of the delegation of the Russian Federation, the delegation of Ukraine emphasizes the following. The Autonomous Republic of Crimea, which is an integral part of Ukraine, was illegally occupied and annexed by the Russian Federation in violation of the OSCE principles and commitments and norms of international law. Ukraine stresses that the mandate of the OSCE Project Co-ordinator in Ukraine extends to the entire territory of Ukraine within its internationally recognized borders, including the Autonomous Republic of Crimea.”

By the European Union:

“In connection with the PC decision on the extension of the mandate of the OSCE Project Co-ordinator in Ukraine, and the statement just issued by the delegation of the Russian Federation, the European Union reiterates our strong condemnation of the illegal annexation of Crimea and Sevastopol to the Russian Federation and we will not recognize it.”

The candidate country Montenegro¹, the country of the Stabilisation and Association Process and potential candidate Albania, and the European Free Trade Association country Norway, member of the European Economic Area, as well as Georgia and San Marino align themselves with this statement.
