European Academic Network on Romani Studies

The European Academic Network on Romani Studies is a new two-year CoE/EU joint project (June 2011- May 2013) whose overall aim is to facilitate intercultural dialogue and support efforts towards the social inclusion of Romani citizens in Europe. To contribute to this goal the Network will:

- increase the visibility of the existing scientific research outside the academic community and enable a more informed decision-taking and policy planning on issues related to Roma at the level of European institutions;
- strengthen the presence of research related to Roma in mainstream academic and policy-related events.

Young/early career researchers will be encouraged to join the Network. More senior members of the Network will offer advice and guidance for the younger researchers and there will be a scheme of travel grants aimed at supporting their participation in international conferences. The activities as a whole will be defined and steered by a Scientific Committee currently composed of 12 members, with the assistance of the Secretary of the Network and a support assistant.

As part of the 2011 agenda of the Network, there will be a participation of the Secretary of the Network in the Summit of Mayors on Roma "Building mutual trust at the grassroots" organised by the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities of the Council of Europe on 22 September in Strasbourg.
