#### STATEMENT BY THE DELEGATION OF UKRAINE

Mr. Chairperson,

In connection with today's statement by the Russian delegation on the status of the Autonomous Republic of Crimea (ARC), the delegation of Ukraine wishes to emphasize the following.

International law prohibits the acquisition of part or all of another State's territory through coercion or force. The Autonomous Republic of Crimea, which remains an integral part of Ukraine, was illegally occupied and annexed by the Russian Federation in violation of OSCE principles and commitments and norms of international law. Illegitimate actions on the part of the Russian Federation do not have any legal consequences with regard to the status of the ARC as an integral part of Ukraine. The territorial integrity of Ukraine within its internationally recognized borders is safeguarded by international law and UN General Assembly resolution 68/262 of 27 March 2014, "Territorial integrity of Ukraine".

The Russian Federation is now in breach of such fundamental principles of the Helsinki Final Act as sovereign equality and respect for the rights inherent in sovereignty, refraining from the threat or use of force, inviolability of frontiers, territorial integrity of States, peaceful settlement of disputes, non-intervention in internal affairs, and fulfilment in good faith of obligations in international law.

We call on the Russian Federation to return to the tenets of international law and reverse the annexation of the Autonomous Republic of Crimea.

The delegation of Ukraine requests that this statement be registered in the journal of the day.

#### STATEMENT BY THE DELEGATION OF SERBIA

Mr. Chairperson, Distinguished colleagues,

I would like to take this opportunity to inform the Forum about the outcomes of the joint Serbian-Swiss OSCE Code of Conduct workshop held from 6 to 9 October 2015 in Belgrade.

The workshop was co-organized by the Republic of Serbia and Switzerland during our consecutive OSCE Chairmanships and supported by the OSCE Conflict Prevention Centre and the OSCE Mission to Serbia, with the aim of promoting the implementation of the Code of Conduct on Politico-Military Aspects of Security within the OSCE and among its Mediterranean and Asian Partners for Co-operation.

The event provided an opportunity to review more than 20 years of the existence and implementation of the Code. It brought together over 60 participants from more than 20 participating States and Partners for Co-operation, as well as representatives of OSCE institutions, Parliamentary Assembly, academia and civil society.

The main topics discussed were related to the democratic control of armed and security forces, parliamentary oversight and control, security sector reform and governance, defence reform, respect for international humanitarian law and for the human rights of armed forces personnel, and the inclusion of issues related to women, peace and security.

It was mentioned that modern security challenges highlight the need for more effective implementation of the OSCE Code of Conduct and therefore for raising awareness of this document among military personnel and staff officers and diplomats and civil society representatives.

Mr. Chairperson,

We will present a summary of the workshop later this month, at the 801st Plenary Meeting of the Forum for Security Co-operation, which will be devoted to the implementation of the OSCE Code of Conduct on Politico-Military Aspects of Security.

Before concluding, on behalf of the Republic of Serbia and on my own behalf I would like to express gratitude for the co-operation and significant support of Switzerland and the OSCE Conflict Prevention Centre. Special thanks are due to the OSCE Mission to Serbia for its assistance in organizing this event.

We thank you for your attention and kindly ask that this statement be attached to the journal of the meeting.
